

# Coronavirus – NSA Global Security Sub-Saharan Africa, Middle East, Asia Update COVID-19

April 5 to April 12, 2020





The death toll from the COVID-19 pandemic that originated in Wuhan, China was recorded at 109,920 as of April 12, while the total number of confirmed cases has reached 1,794,641 worldwide.

On April 5, Pakistan's Minister for Railways Sheikh Rasheed announced that Pakistan Railways will resume train services from April 15.

According to the UAE's state news agency, the emirate of Dubai has imposed a complete curfew from April 5 for a period of two weeks as part of an effort to mitigate the spread of the coronavirus. Individuals will not be allowed to leave their residences, except for essential purposes or if they are working in vital sectors that are exempted from the restrictions. Essential needs include grocery shopping or medical emergencies.

In DRC, authorities announced the isolation of Goma, Beni, and Butembo cities on April 5. The Gambia's National Assembly approved an extension of the country's state of emergency for 45 days starting April 5.

Kuwait extended its suspension of work in all "ministries, government agencies, bodies and institutes" until April 25. Saudi Arabia's Ministry of Interior announced on April 6 that a complete 24-hour curfew has been imposed in Riyadh, Tabuk, Dammam, Dhahran, Hofuf, Jeddah, Qatif, Taif, and Khobar, effective April 7 until further notice.

Kenya has banned all travel into and from the Nairobi Metropolitan area for 21 days from April 6. A similar restriction of movement is slated to begin in Mombasa, Kilifi, and Kwale from 19:00 on April 8.

As of April 7, authorities in Bahrain announced that it is mandatory for citizens and residents to wear face masks at all times when they are outside their homes. Egypt will suspend all congregational religious activities for the upcoming month of Ramadan, which is slated to begin on April 23. Authorities in Turkey confirmed that any foreign nationals who outstay their visit visas due to COVID-19-related travel restrictions will not face any fines or penalties.

Eritrea announced the extension of a ban on passenger flights to and from the country for another 21 days on April 8. Ethiopia declared a state of emergency and warned of "grave legal measures" against persons undermining the ongoing restrictions. The Plateau State government in Nigeria announced a six day total lockdown in order to carry out fumigation efforts effective April 9.

Cambodia announced on April 9 that any individuals who left to another province for the Khmer New Year celebrations despite the ban will be required to undergo 14 days of isolation at a government facility before returning to work. On April 8, India made it compulsory to wear masks when outdoors in Mumbai, Delhi, and Uttar Pradesh. Furthermore, the Supreme Court of India directed the central government on April 8 to make all COVID-19 tests free of cost, even those conducted by private agencies.

The US Embassy in Cairo, Egypt reported on April 9 that a direct flight is available from Cairo to London on April 12.

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The Jordanian Minister of Information reportedly stated on April 9 that a nationwide curfew will be imposed from 00:01 (local time) on April 10, effective until 23:59 on April 11. According to Oman's official news agency, a lockdown will be imposed on Muscat Governorate from 10:00 (local time) on April 10 until 10:00 on April 22.

lvory Coast has extended the night-time curfew to April 24 on April 8. The National Assembly of Mauritania adopted a bill authorizing the government to take all measures necessary to fight the virus and its effects through ordinance on April 8. The US Embassy in Niger announced on April 9 that a repatriation flight is scheduled for April 10.

In Cambodia, all forms of travel between districts and provinces are restricted until April 16 with limited exceptions. East Timor has closed its borders and banned any entry and exit, regardless of citizenship, to take effect on April 13. Authorities imposed a partial lockdown in Jakarta, Indonesia, with security forces deployed to enforce social distancing.

Angola extended its state of emergency for an additional 15 days, Guinea extended its state of emergency for another 21 days, and Botswana extended its state of emergency for six months. Ghana extended its partial lockdown for another week from April 13 though, stated that borders would remain closed indefinitely.

On April 10, Gabon's PM Julien Nkoghe Bekale announced that Libreville and its neighboring cities will be in total containment from April 13, for a period of two weeks. In Niger, the government announced that all citizens will have to wear masks in public spaces, including grocery stores and on the street from April 11.

In India, Telangana and Maharashtra states have reportedly extended their lockdowns until April 30, while reports on April 11 indicate that Prime Minister Narendra Modi may elect for the same approach nationwide

In Israel, the government decided on April 12 to continue receiving inbound passenger flights; however, all arrivals to Israel, including Israeli residents, will be quarantined in government-administered residential facilities.

In CAR, all restrictive measures including the closure of the airport were extended for another two weeks, while inter- and intra- urban travel has been halted. In Congo, the government ordered the obligatory wearing of face masks in public markets. The government issued directives for the state of emergency on April 11, including banning handshakes, restricting gatherings to a maximum of four people, reducing crowds on public transport, and halting all evictions and layoffs. Violations can result in up to three years in prison.

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# Anti-Foreign Sentiment & Civil Unrest

In addition to the various government-implemented measures and health risks associated with COVID-19, a number of other risks, particularly related to civil unrest and xenophobia have arisen throughout the world.

Anti-foreign incidents have been reported in multiple countries in **Sub-Saharan Africa.** In Kenya, this has included protests against Chinese travelers, as well as violent incidents targeting Asians. Additional incidents have been reported in Ethiopia, with both verbal harassment and small-scale violence. This has grown to include harassment of people who appear to be European in Kenya as well as in Cameroon, Ivory Coast, and Senegal. This trend is likely to continue given that the vast majority of cases in Africa are imported from Europe and COVID-19 is increasingly viewed in many African countries as a disease spread by white people.

Several countries and territories across **Asia** have witnessed protests, most notably Hong Kong, India, Indonesia, Kazakhstan, Pakistan, Sri Lanka, and Thailand. Such protests have been held against designated quarantine centers, perceived inadequate responses to controlling the outbreak, or to call for a ban on Chinese travelers. Online campaigns with noted anti-China sentiment have circulated in Japan, Indonesia, and Singapore, while Australia reported a spike in racism against Chinese Australians from late January. Protests were also held in Indonesia against the arrival of Chinese travelers, while multiple businesses and restaurants in the aforementioned countries, as well as South Korea and Vietnam, have denied services to Chinese nationals.

• According to the US Embassy, all passengers on domestic flights in Turkey are required to submit a travel permit obtained from the Travel Permit Council. All individuals with e-devlet accounts (Turkish citizens) can request those permits online. The process for those without e-devlet accounts has not yet been established.
• On April 2, Turkey's national flag carrier, Turkish Airlines, announced the suspension of all international flights until May 1.
• The President also announced on April 3 that it is mandatory for all the people in Turkey to wear face masks in crowded areas, including stores.
• A curfew restricting those below the age of 20 from leaving their residences, except for necessary purposes, was imposed on April 3 until further notice.
• <b>UPDATE</b> : On April 5, the Mol announced exceptions to the newly imposed curfew on individuals below the age of 20. This includes individuals employed in state institutions and organizations as civil servants, contracted personnel or workers; individuals who work in the private sector and can prove this with social security registration; and seasonal agricultural workers. These exceptions will not apply to those born after January 1, 2002.
• <b>UPDATE</b> : On April 6, the Turkish national news agency reported that Turkish Airlines will suspend all domestic flights within the country until April 20.
• <b><u>UPDATE</u></b> : On April 6, the UK's FCO announced that, at present, there are "extremely limited commercial options to return to the UK from Turkey". The statement indicated that UK citizens "should not assume that UK special charter flights [flights in partnership between the government and airlines to fly home British travellers from "priority" countries], will become available in countries where commercial routes are operating."
<ul> <li><u>UPDATE</u>: On April 7, according to the UK's FCO, Turkish authorities have confirmed that any foreign nationals who outstay their visit visas due to COVID-19-related travel restrictions will not face any fines or penalties.</li> </ul>

- On April 2, Emirates Airlines stated that authorities had granted the airline permission to restart some international passenger flights from Dubai, starting from April 6. The destinations are London Heathrow, Frankfurt, Paris, Zurich, and Brussels.
- On April 3, Etihad Airways stated its intention to relaunch a limited number of international passenger flights from April 5, pending permission by authorities. According to an April 4 statement by Etihad, a limited number of repatriation flights will be offered by Etihad from April 5, serving Seoul, Singapore, Manila, and Jakarta. At the time of writing, there is no indication when regular passenger flights will be resumed.
- On April 4, authorities decided to extend the nationwide sterilization program, and in turn, the nightly curfew between 20:00 (local time) and 06:00, until further notice. Residents are advised to stay at home between the aforementioned hours "unless absolutely necessary to obtain essential food supplies or medicine or perform essential jobs in vital sectors". Special job categories include the energy sector, as well as those working in communication, health, education, security, the police, and the military. According to the Ministry of Interior (MoI), local authorities in each Emirate will be able to implement the disinfection plans as per the requirements of their facilities and establishments.
- On April 4, the government reportedly instructed all residents to wear face masks whenever they leave their homes.
- **UPDATE**: According to the UAE's state news agency, the emirate of Dubai has imposed a complete lockdown from April 5 for a period of two weeks as part of an effort to mitigate the spread of the coronavirus. Individuals will not be allowed to leave their residences, except for essential purposes or if they are working in vital sectors that are exempted from the restrictions. Essential needs include grocery shopping or medical emergencies. Only one family member is permitted to leave the house for this purpose. Dubai's media office has released a statement indicating that all individuals will be required to obtain a permit prior to leaving the house from dxbpermit.gov.ae. According to the statement, the curfew may be subject to renewal.
- **UPDATE**: Per April 7 reports, the emirate of Dubai has extended the temporary closure of all commercial activities until April 18.
- **UPDATE**: On April 11, the Emirati Ministry of Health and Community Protection announced that 376 new coronavirus cases were recorded on April 11, bringing the total number of confirmed cases in the country to 3,736. Meanwhile, 170 additional individuals infected with the virus recovered, while four additional individuals were declared to have died from contracting the disease.
