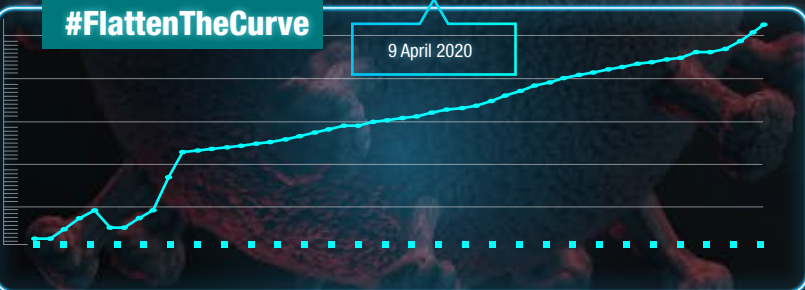

### KEY DEVELOPMENTS IN THE NEWS



#### India's financial capital has entered the "Community Transmission" stage.

Mumbai is the biggest hotspot of Covid-19 in the country and has entered the stage of community transmission as COVID-19 cases are now surfacing in Mumbai that are not connected with people who have travelled to India from overseas.

Currently the total positive cases in the city is 702, with 45 deaths reported (a few of which had no pre-existing medical conditions).

The G-South Ward in Mumbai has the highest number of cases (78). Most of the patients come from the fishermen's colonies of Worli, Prabhadevi and Lower Parel. Mumbai's D Ward, which has Byculla in its limits, has the second highest number of cases. In addition, localities such as Dharavi, Kurla, Nehru Nagar, Bandra and Andheri have also registered a considerable number of positive coronavirus cases.

#### Domestic violence in its peak

The National Commission for Women (NCW), which receives complaints of domestic violence from across the country, has recorded more than a two-fold rise in gender-based violence in the national Coronavirus lockdown period. The total complaints from women rose from 116 in the first week of March (March 2-8), to 257 in the final week (March 23-April 1).

The cases of domestic violence are highest in Uttar Pradesh, Bihar, Haryana and Punjab.

#### Lockdown unlikely to end after 14th April

A number of states have indicated extensions of the current lockdown, especially in areas identified as hotspots of the deadly virus, while wearing masks or face cover was made mandatory in Uttar Pradesh, Delhi, Mumbai and also in Jammu & Kashmir and Ladakh.

Prime Minister Modi has hinted at extending the lockdown during interaction with various party leaders and a decision on this will be taken by the Prime Minister after discussion with Chief Ministers of all states on 11th April.

### ECONOMIC OUTLOOK



#### Review of impact of COVID-19 on Indian economy

In the financial sector, banks and non-banking finance companies will witness a precipitous rise in non-performing assets, from both the private corporates and the retail sectors as firms and households struggle to deal with this unprecedented situation. A large number of firms, especially the micro, small and medium businesses and self-employed individuals are likely to default on their bank and NBFC Loans.

Other sectors which are going to be significantly affected due to the lockdown are real estate and FMCG. With large numbers of informal labourers migrating back to their hometowns due to the absence of work and income, many projects and factories have already been impacted and will likely be badly affected by labour shortages once the lockdown ends.

Similarly, the transportation of essential items has been hit as labourers and drivers have demanded salary increases of 30-40%, resulting in shortages, increased costs and a resultant black-market for essential items.

### ANALYSIS ON THE LOCAL SECURITY SITUATION



An issue that is concerning for many multinational corporations operating in India is securing their premises and facilities during this lockdown period, where valuable equipment, confidential information and infrastructure may be left unprotected. Equally, some organisations that have already evacuated, or are planning to evacuate expatriate staff out of India, face the difficult task of securing these empty residences until the occupants return.

Local government decisions to free large numbers of prisoners as part of measures to decrease crowding in view of Covid-19 outbreak could backfire. Many of these prisoners (some of whom will be released on parole) will face very difficult times, having no income or prospect of finding jobs in the current situation and there are real concerns about many of these individuals returning to a life of crime. In a recent case a criminal who was recently released from jail allegedly murdered the wife of a Crime Branch head constable in Nagpur, Maharashtra
