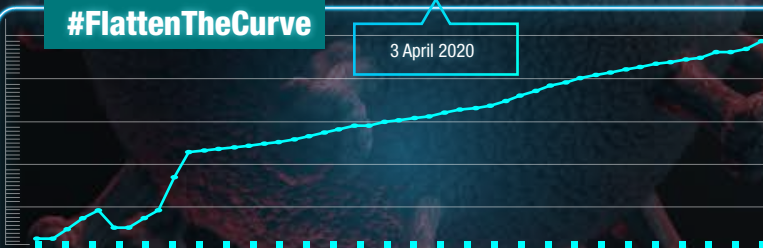

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KEY DEVELOPMENTS IN THE NEWS



Tablighi Jamaat meet resulted in rapid increase in Covid-19 cases in India

Of the total Covid-19 cases in the country, almost 20 per cent can be traced to the Tablighi Jamaat meet. In addition, 19 people connected to the meet have died in different states. While Telangana has reported nine deaths, Delhi, Maharashtra and J&K have reported two deaths each.

The number is likely go up further as test results of nearly 8,000 Tablighi Jamaat followers and people who came in contact with them after the gathering at Nizamuddin mosque are still pending.

Islamic State threat during coronavirus outbreak: Delhi Police personnel on target, alert issued

Delhi Police personnel stationed at police barricades and pickets to maintain the law and order during the lockdown in the national capital have come under threat from Islamic Statet. The terrorist organisation is alledgedly planning to launch a lone-wolf attack on the security officers in Delhi during the coronavirus outbreak.

The attack could be in the form of a stabbing, shooting, or ramming of the police picket using a large vehicle.

Attacks on Doctors and Healthworkers

Attacks on medical personnel and healthcare workers have worsened over the past few days as healthcare workers and civic officials were attacked by a mob of angry locals in an Indore neighbourhood on Wednesday, as they visited the area to screen residents for signs of Covid-19.

Earlier in the week locals from the Ranipura area of the same city allegedly spat at and abused officials during screening procedures and doctors at Hyderabad's Gandhi Hospital were allegedly attacked after a patient infected with the novel coronavirus died this week.

ECONOMIC OUTLOOK



Review of impact of COVID-19 on Indian economy

India's aggressive 21-day lockdown could bring the country's growth down to 2.5% from the 4.5 to 5 per cent it had earlier estimated. However, even if global economies bounce back sooner than expected, Indian MSMEs (Medium, Small & Micro Enterprise) are likely to pay a high price.

Many of these companies are too small to have enough of a "cushion" to last through a pandemic like this. Add to this the fact that many of these companies have been asked to down shutters or curtail operations while still paying employees as well as costs for taxes, power, and other utilities may spell economic disaster for them.

ANALYSIS ON THE LOCAL SECURITY SITUATION



In India 700 million people live at subsistence-level (with very little savings to fend for their families for a month without income) and about 85% of India's workforce is employed in the informal sector which is being severely impacted by the lockdown. This desperation could easily result in increases in crimes such as robbery, burglary, mugging and violent crime.

As many companies are instructing staff to work from home, cybercriminals have been exploiting fears around the COVID-19 outbreak to conduct email scams, phishing and ransomware attacks. These emails and messages entice users to open malicious attachments by offering more information related to the COVID-19 situation and are likely to increase.

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
